Sei Solo **Project Performance**

Welcome to this informal sharing of young people's creative responses to the music of Bach.

The story behind Bach's *Sei Solo* mirrors many of the themes we have explored with students from Exeter House School and Exeter House Vocational Centre throughout this project. How can their voices be heard? Can we help these young people express themselves through sharing Bach's music?

Introduction from Howard Moody, La Folia's artistic director

A couple of years ago I overheard someone say that Bach's music wasn't suitable for young people. I didn't comment, but rather turned my sense of outrage towards creating a project involving young people with Bach's music at the centre. Within minutes of our first session I was overcome once again by the power of Bach's music to create an intimacy between performer and listener whilst its perfectly crafted structures carry listeners to a safe place.

Bach's *Sonatas and Partitas* for solo violin exist in manuscript form with the inscription 'Sei Solo' on the front cover. This translates as 'I am alone' as well as 'Six Solo'. There are stories, perhaps myths around this title, thought either to have been written on Bach's return from a concert tour to find that his wife and one of his children had died, or that he was put in prison for a month for applying for a job without the Prince's permission so filled up his time alone in a cell writing for a solo instrument (the great 20-minute *Chaconne* for solo violin is but a fraction of his month's work!). These stories of aloneness triggered a memory of some of the themes that the Exeter House students explored in our 2015 project *Magna Songs*.

In addition to Bach's solo violin music, this La Folia *Sei Solo* project also brings the Bach *Cello Suites* to a new audience. Originally written around 1720 for Bach's employer Prince Leopold, they were apparently played in a private audience in the Prince's bedroom. They were lost for 200 years until found in a Spanish market by the cellist Pablo Casals. The music has now successfully travelled to Exeter House and the new Vocational Centre. The students have reinterpreted Bach's music through movement as well as the students' own artwork. In addition, the project participants have created new songs, sometimes generated out of Bach's chord structures, recreating something of Bach's own creative process. All their words were uttered first by the students themselves in response to the project's themes. As with all La Folia projects, they then spontaneously sung their own melodies, converting their own words into lyrics on which we have built harmonic structures to bind all their creative contributions together.

The 'performance' or rather 'sharing' of our project will draw from a wide range of Bach's music together with some of the songs that the students have created themselves alongside arias from some of Bach's great choral masterpieces:

It is fantastic to think that this is just the beginning of the journey that La Folia will be taking with this community of musicians this season. They have all inspired the limitless potential of music. By Christmas we will have released an album of songs created by the students at Wiltshire College and University Centre, Salisbury with whom we made so many projects over the last years including *The Ring Cycle*, *Magna Songs* and *Evening Songs*. And then by July we hope to have brought them all together for another *Evening Songs* project in the Cathedral.

An introduction from Susan Francis, visual artist

My involvement in the project is to draw from the musical content already generated - whether that be the narrative represented, the lyrics participants have created, or simply the seed of a concept shared - and to use that inspiration to generate the visual art content. In this case we used the emotive backdrop of Bach's *Sei Solo* pieces, which were played while we worked, exploring and celebrating our collective individuality - in other words, 'what it is to be me'. Even with the same materials, tools and processes, no student will draw, print or paint like another, and together we have experienced different ways to make our own individual mark in response to Bach's work.
